absorb to soak up a liquid absorbent able to soak up liquid easily adult an animal that has reached maturity a mixture of gases surrounding the Earth air living, not dead alive animal a living organism that eats food for nutrition annotate add notes to a piece of text or diagram apprentice a person who is learning a job or skill from an expert bar chart a diagram which uses the height of a rectangle to represent the numerical values of variables **birth** the the process of bearing young; when a baby animal comes out of an egg or out of its mother boil to cause a liquid to reach the temperature at which it turns into a gas breathe to take air in and out of the lungs brick a block made out of dried clay; used in building a growth on a plant that develops into a new leaf, flower or shoot bud rounded part of a plant usually formed underground, which grows into a new plant in the bulb growing season calf the young of certain animals, for example cows carnivore an animal which only eats other animals (meat) Carroll diagram used to group things in a yes/no fashion catapult a machine that is used to throw missiles cereals grains that are used for food, for example wheat chick the young of a bird classify to group objects according to similarities in appearance or properties compare to estimate, measure, or note the similarity or dissimilarity between items compost decayed organic material which is used as a fertiliser for plants conclusion a summary of what was found out in an investigation cub the young of certain animals, for example bears and lions a group of foods that all contain, or are made from, milk dairv dead no longer alive the rotting of matter through the action of bacteria and fungi decay dependent requiring someone else for support elastic able to resume its normal shape after being stretched evidence data or observations which can be used to form a conclusion fabric cloth produced by weaving fibres fair test an experiment where only one variable has been changed and all others are kept constant fat a nutrient used as a source of energy flexible able to bend without breaking

flower the reproductive structure in flowering plants food chain a series of organisms dependent on the previous as a source of food fruit part of a plant where seeds develop frv cook in hot fat germinate when a first shoot grows from a seed grow to increase in size or number habitat a place where an animal finds the things it needs to live – food, water, and shelter healthy in a good physical and mental condition healthy diet a diet which provides all the nutrients the body needs in the correct amounts (balanced) herbivore an animal that only eats plants herbs plants used for flavouring, food, perfume or medicine hygiene conditions used to keep the body clean hygienic relating to being clean in order to maintain good health identify to establish what something is independent not requiring anyone else for support investigate to use scientific method to solve a problem kid the young of a goat (plural leaves) the parts of the plant that absorb light and gases from the air to aid in the leaf process of making food life cycle the series of changes in the life of an organism from birth to death manure animal dung used as a fertiliser for plants material the matter from which a thing is or can be made mature plant a plant that has completed its development metal a material that is usually solid, shiny and hard missile an object which is propelled at a target muscles body tissues which use contractions to produce movement never-lived has never been a living organism, or part of one, for example metal observations the record of closely monitoring something observe to closely monitor something offspring the young of a living organism omnivore an animal that eats both plants and other animals once-lived was once a living organism, or part of one, but is now dead, for example wood opaque not able to be seen through; not transparent order to place objects in relation to each other according to a sequence or pattern pattern a regular sequence physical activity movement of the body; exercise

plant (verb) to place a plant or seed into the ground
plastic a synthetic material that can be moulded into shape when soft and then sets into a rigid form

predict to use scientific knowledge to say what you think will be the result of an investigation
prediction what you think will be the result of an investigation
pregnancy the period between conception and birth
property (plural properties) a characteristic of a material
pulse the movement of blood through an artery which can be felt on the surface of the skin
radicle the first part of a seedling to emerge from a seed
record to write down measurements or observations
rigid unable to bend without breaking; not flexible
rock a solid natural mineral which forms part of the Earth
root part of a plant that grows into the ground, anchors the plant and takes in water and minerals
scale a range of values used for measuring
scatter graph a graph of plotted points which shows the relationship between two sets of data
seedling a young plant
seeds embryos produced by a plant that can grow into a new plant
shelter something that provides cover or protection; a home
shoot a young stem or root
simmer to heat a liquid just under its boiling point so it bubbles gently
soil a mixture typically containing organic matter, clay, rock particles and living organisms
source of food where food can be obtained
stem the part of a plant that supports the branches, leaves and flowers. It helps to take water and nutrients around the plant.
table a way to organise data into columns so the relationship between variables can be seen
tally chart a table used to record data where each score is represented as a line
teenager a person between the ages of 13 and 19
toddler a young child who is learning to walk; around 1-3 years old
translucent property of a substance which light can be seen through, but not detailed shapes
transparent see-through
unhealthy in poor physical and/or mental health
vegetable a plant, or part of a plant, used as food

Venn diagram a diagram used to sort things into circles, with common elements of the sets being placed in the intersections of the circles

waterproof keeps out water

wilting the process of a plant becoming limp due to a loss of water
